Ideas and thoughts from recent meetings

Elders

The leadership team has been processing the elder nominations and hopes to put names before the congregation for final affirmation soon.

Building Project

The team will wait until final figures are in for the cost of the building project before asking the church to make pledges for support. They feel it is important for people to know what they are investing in and what the needs are before making a decision on contributing. The team will provide information on how much has already been brought in, how much will be needed per month, and when the project can start. They hope to have projected numbers before the end of the year, recognizing that the building project vision has been a very long process.

Route 40 and 42 Interchange

The Ohio Department of Transportation is planning a new interchange at Route 40 and 42. With the new setup, the church would lose access to Route 42, which would reduce the property value. It appears ODOT is only willing to pay about a quarter of the estimated loss in property value. A team from LCF is looking into further negotiation for a higher payment.

Charley Gregg Memorial Fund

The church received donations given in memory of Charley Gregg. The leadership team unanimously agreed to these funds to purchase something special in memory of Charley like a tree, landscaping, or some other kind of memorial, to be purchased once the new church building is completed.

An interview with Audrey Maust

Where are you from?

I grew up in Accident, Maryland.

How did you end up in Ohio?

I was at camp Hebron in Pennsylvania when I decided I wanted to become a teacher. I didn't see a whole lot of future in staying at the camp. I wanted to work with children, so I decided to continue my education. I came to Rosedale first of all, and then I transferred to Cedarville. After Cedarville I went to Ecuador for two years and taught English at a Christian school in voluntary service with RMM. Then I accepted a position as a teacher at Shekinah [Christian School]and I've been here ever since.

If you were in Ecuador for two years, do you know Spanish?

Um, no. I got by, by the time I left I felt like I was just on the verge of becoming a lot more fluent but I feel like I've lost a lot. That makes me sad. I tried so hard to keep it, but after a while I got too busy. It was nice while it lasted.

What are some of your favorite Christmas traditions?

I like making Christmas cookies, that's always fun. I like soft molasses cookies dipped in white chocolate. And just being with family, kicking back and relaxing and reading books—those are my favorite traditions. Another Christmas tradition I do with my class is to give out candy canes to my students and then read them the story called *The Legend of the Candy Cane*. They are allowed to eat their candy throughout the whole day. This is a big deal for fourth and fifth graders. We also make a Christmas village made out of milk cartons, icing, pretzels sticks for the logs on the cabins and frosted mini wheats for the roof.

What would be your ideal way to spend a day?

You ask me when I'm really busy, so I would love to just do nothing, with no agenda. I'd have my house all cleaned up my wash cleaned and have nothing to do but read a good book.

What do you like to do for fun?

I like playing board games or card games, and spending time with my nieces and nephews. I like biking a lot. I love hiking, Frisbee golf, and volleyball, although I have not played that for a long time. Reading, of course. In the summer I really enjoy playing tennis.

What is something people may not know about you?

If my parents had known this I would have gotten in trouble, but in the barn I used to climb up to the beams and walk across them. They were probably two stories high. When we got to a certain place we could actually jump off into the corn, but before that there was nothing underneath but boards. I was pretty daring back then; I didn't think I could die. Right now I would be much more fearful of heights but back then I would climb all the way up the ladder on the silo.

What is something you have never done, but would like to someday?

I think it would be fun to take a hot air balloon ride in Switzerland. I think that would be the coolest thing to see the Alps from a hot air balloon. That's a dream that probably won't come true but it would be awesome to see.
